

Hurricane Supply Check List

- Drinking Water**
1 Gallon per person/per day
- Water for Sanitation Use**
Store extra containers of water to be used for flushing toilets, cleaning, and bathing.
- Non-Perishable Food**
Maintain at least 3-7 days of food for each member of the family. Ready-to-eat canned meats, vegetables and fruits.
- Baby Needs**
Special foods, formula, extra diapers, medicines, blankets, diaper rash ointment, baby wipes, bottles, pacifiers, etc.
- Sanitation**
Toilet paper, towelettes, soap, baby wipes, liquid hand sanitizer, personal hygiene items, garbage bags with ties, etc.
- First Aid Kit**
Adhesive bandages, gauze, hand wipes, non-latex gloves, tape, rubbing alcohol, antiseptic spray, etc.
- Non-Prescription Drugs**
Aspirin, Ibuprofen, antacid, Benadryl, Peroxide, etc.
- Prescription Drugs**
Blood pressure, insulin, contact lenses, etc.
- Clothing & Bedding**
Work shoes, towels, rain gear, sleeping bags, blankets, gloves, tent, camping equipment, etc.
- Entertainment**
Games, books, extra batteries, etc.
- Tools & Supplies**
Batteries, flashlights, weather radio, glow sticks, candles, storm lanterns, etc.



Have a plan in place ahead of time.
Start your storm prep 48-72 hours in advance.

Get your boat to a safe haven, or out of the water.
Harbortown Marina is located in a protected harbor with minimal tidal changes, even during storms.

Secure your boat, and protect it from impact.
Protect vulnerable angles with extra fenders and used tires.
Double up on mooring lines, but leave enough slack for your boat to move with the tide.

Secure hatches, seal openings, and lash down or remove all loose items.

Remove all valuables and documents from your vessel - especially insurance information!

Damage to piers and other boats caused by your vessel is legally your responsibility.

Other items to keep in mind as you prepare for a hurricane:

- Shut off fuel lines and thru-hull fittings
- Make an inventory of items left aboard
- Change the batteries in your bilge pump, and make sure it works
- Turn off all other devices that use electricity
- Never leave a boat on davits or a lift
- Store trailered boats near a wall, home or another place where limbs or trees cannot fall and damage them
- Double lines, and keep them high on pilings
- Take photographs of your vessel for insurance purposes
